LECTURES: Historical background of Russia's foreign and security policy; Russian Foreign Policy Options (Westernizers, Realists, Eurasianists); Russia's strategic thinking and security of Russian Federation; Determinants of Russia's foreign and security policy (geopolitical factor, civilizational factor; national interests, political factors, military capabilities, economic capabilities); Doctrinal and institutional frameworks of Russia's foreign and security policy; Russia and multipolar world order; Russia's relation with countries of Euro-Atlantic security complex; Russia's Asiatic Policy (Middle East, Central Asia, South Asia, East Asia).
