# CLASSES:

The program of classes is divided into two parts: theoretical and practical.

In the theoretical part, the exercises will be devoted to understanding and analyzing the theory of American security strategies, for example: American idealism *versus* realism; Isolationism; America as a regional power - Monroe Doctrine; Wilson Doctrine; America as a global power; Cold war doctrines (form Truman to Reagan); Post-cold war strategies (from Bush senior to Trump). Moreover, in theoretical part of the course students will be familiar with practical and legal aspects of American foreign and security policy, especially institutions involved responsible for creating foreign and security policy such as President, vice President, Secretary of State and State Department, Secretary of Defense and Defense Department, Congress, CIA.

In the practical part, the US bilateral and multilateral relations with individual entities of international relations will be analyzed, e.g.: US-Europe (Russia Federation, Poland, UE); US-Middle East (Iran, Iraq, Turkey, Saudi Arabia, Israel); US-Asia and Pacific (South Korea, North Korea, Japan, China, Taiwan); US-Latin America (Mexico and so called Western Hemisphere).

The basis for passing the course is a positive grade obtained from the essay.

#### Learning purpose:

The main objective of this course is to analyze the process of the evolution of the US foreign and security policy from its independence to modern times and to understand the complexity of American bilateral/multilateral relations with members of international community. Among American security strategies which will be discussed briefly we can distinguish: realism, idealism, isolationism, Monroe doctrine, Wilson doctrine, contaminant doctrines (from Truman to Reagan, including detente strategy), Bush senior New World Order, Clinton Enlargement and Engagement, Bush doctrine, Obama doctrine and Trump foreign policy.

An additional objective of this course is also to understand the process of American transition from ex-colonial state till regional power and at the end superpower and all global consequences of this process.
