LECTURES: Concept of human rights (HR) and its origins; origins of the legal protection of HR in domestic and international legal orders; general overview of the international law of HR – sources of the international law of HR, classification and special features of HR treaties, supervision procedures under HR treaties; general overview of the system of the European Convention on HR – history, parties, structure, values, obligations under ECHR, classification of rights, methods of limitation, complaint procedure; Selected problems of the contemporary international protection of HR - death penalty, euthanasia, prohibition of torture and terrorist threat, same-sex marriages, religious symbols in the public sphere, prohibition of collective expulsion of aliens.

Learning purpose: Introduction to the main themes of the international law of human rights with special attention to the standards of the European Convention on Human Rights

On completion of the study programme the graduate will gain:

Knowledge: Knowledge of origins, theoretical foundations, sources and standards of the international law of human rights

Skills: Skills to analyze and interpret human rights documents and to use the jurisprudence of international human rights supervisory bodies
